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*I recorded the percentage of female awardees when there was available data on the ETH website. It was possible only for prizes awarded to researchers because I could check their gender on their professional web page (as opposed to students). These figures are to be compared with the percentage of female professors at ETH, which was 6% in 2008 and 13.9% in 2017. When I could do it I also compared the percentage since the beginning of the prize and the percentage since 2008, because as there are more female scientists today, old prizes have a very low percentage as compared to recent ones. 2008 was chosen because there was a great increase in the percentage of female professors at ETH between 2007 and 2008 (we can see it on the Figure 1, which was taken from the 2017/2018 gender monitoring report of Equal!.
